







These elected officials determine the future of our education system, public safety, healthcare, our roads, bridges and highways, natural resources, sewer and water systems, and much more. These issues make a difference here at home.



As John Adams said, "Always vote for principle – though you may vote alone – and you may cherish the sweetest reflection that your vote is never lost."




